

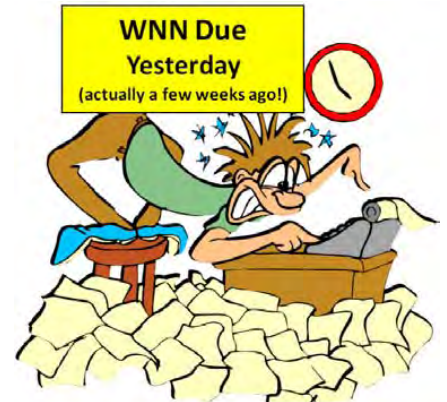

Land Update



Though we would like for this to go a little more quickly, we want to do it right the first time. Things ARE rolling along with the development of the very generously donated properties in Leavenworth.

We participated in a Leavenworth Development Review Committee meeting in September, where we discussed with City Officials what we'd like to do with the property and how to proceed from proposal to approval. They provided invaluable input and guidance to help us do things right the first time.

We've cut brush, installed a gate at the upper end of the property to restrict vehicle access, and posted signs to discourage trespassing.

We visited the "Dirt Works Studio" at KU, and talked with Architect Chad Kraus about the possibility of participating in a KU project to design and build a rammed earth building to serve as the office/training/meeting space.

We invited some 50 property owners surrounding our land to visit with us on October 6th, so they could hear what we were planning, and get their questions answered. We were very happy to

learn that not one of the people in attendance were opposed to what we discussed.

We've retained Level 4 Engineering (Brett Napier) to help us lay out the Planned Use Development (PUD) document that we'll present to City Officials soon.

We've also begun the process to have the land recognized as being used for benevolent purposes, which will significantly decrease the amount of property taxes owed. (We're happy to pay what we should, but don't want to pay what other not-for-profit benevolent 501(c)(3) organizations are excused.)

Once the PUD is approved, we'll be able to move forward with planning for building on the site, to begin (HOPEFULLY) in summer of 2012. That will give us an office, training, meeting space where we can host events, offer programs, and be open to the public at least 15 hours a week.

The property in Leavenworth provides us a base for current operations. We do not believe it is the proper place for a large-scale animal shelter. It is a stepping stone to building and operating the no-kill Community Animal Care Center that Leavenworth County needs. We still believe the best place for the Community Animal Care Center is south of Lansing, centrally located in the County, with consideration for areas of likely future population growth.

Cold & Critters

Winter is upon us and with it comes concerns for our furry friends. The most obvious concerns involve environmental conditions and effects.

Cold and wind can injure all dogs, but we should be especially concerned for older dogs, puppies, and short-haired breeds such as Chihuahuas, Miniature Pinschers, and Greyhounds. (Significant snowfall can also lead to sunburn in some breeds.) Limit these pets' exposure to cold as much as possible and protect them with water and cold resistant clothing on outings. Boots can help protect their feet from ice and snow.

Try not to let your dog eat snow— it could lead to upset stomachs, and there may be foreign objects or toxins in the snow.

It is wise to keep your dog on a lead in the winter if for no other reasons than to prevent your pet from straying onto thin ice on ponds, or becoming a victim of a car skidding on ice.

If you normally have your dog's fur clipped during the warmer months, allow his coat to grow during the winter to provide extra protection. When you bathe your dog during the winter, be sure that she is completely dry before you allow her to go outside.

Also related to grooming is foot care. Snow, ice, and cold can result in cracked or irritated paw pads. A pet-specific foot balm will help to condition the pads.

Cold-weather chemicals can also be a concern— one of the most dangerous (deadly) is antifreeze (ethylene glycol). This chemical is not only deadly, it has a taste that is attractive to dogs. We need to be especially vigilant about both the presence of this chemical and its storage.

Many ice-melt products are skin irritants. Make sure to wash your pet's feet off if they are exposed to ice-melt. Dogs with long fur or short legs may also have to have their undersides washed off after exposure to ice-melt.

It is a good idea to work on loose-lead training before the snow flies; a hard pulling dog can make life very challenging during an outing on an icy drive or sidewalk.

Working for PEOPLE and PETS



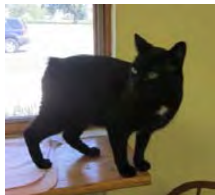

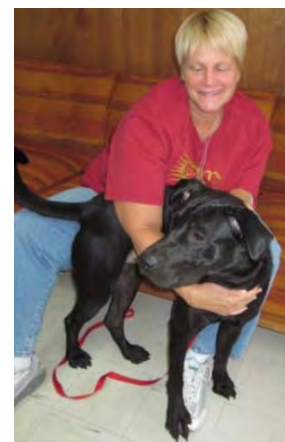
It's Never Boring on the Board

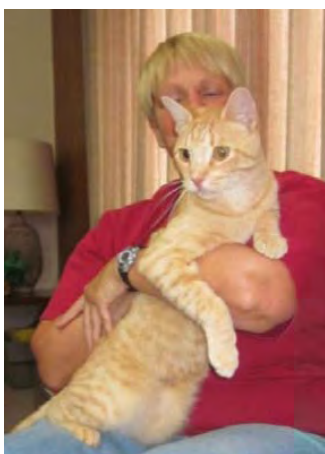

Microchips Work!

Anna and her neighbors in Leavenworth just loved Butternut. He was a nice cat that frequented their decks and porches. Everyone looked out for him, but they wanted to make sure he wasn't breeding, and that he was healthy. So, Butternut came to the Spay/Neuter transport in Easton in September.

That's where we noticed that he really didn't need surgery. He'd already been neutered! Hmmmm – so maybe someone owned Butternut, and cared enough to microchip him? Maybe he wasn't abandoned, but just lost?

We scanned him, and he did indeed have a chip, and his name was Owen. The chip led to a family in Georgia, who were thrilled to know he was safe. He'd gotten lost while they were in the process of moving. At first, they thought it would be great to be reunited, but when they found out there were people here advocating for him, and looking for a new indoor home for him, they agreed to let Kitty Cat Connection (the rescue they adopted from) work out a new situation.

Kitty Cat Connection was more than happy to take him back, but Anna and her neighbors had gotten so attached to Butternut, they couldn't stand the idea of him going back to a shelter, or even a foster home. They wanted to have a chance to find him a new home of his own – preferably with someone they knew so they could see him. They didn't want him going to strangers.

Anna and her neighbors found Butternut a super new home, where he's loved, cherished, and has his microchip information updated, so if he gets lost again, he can get back home right away!



Archy's Story

Archy came to his original family when he was 6 weeks old. They loved him for 14 years, through multiple military moves (including overseas ones), the birth of their two human boys, and the addition of Rocket, a super smart wire-haired terrier. When the family got orders AGAIN to go overseas, with an imminent deployment of the soldier husband to a conflict area, they began the process to get Archy qualified to go with them. That's when their veterinarian recommended that Archy not make the trip. The family knew Archy had too much life left to live to end it, so they asked LCHS, Inc. to help.

We worked with the family for a couple of months prior to their departure, getting to know Archy and the family, having him at multiple events, and even on KSHB-NBC Action News.

Soon after Archy's first family departed the area, we placed him with a nice family who wanted to give him a great home. Unfortunately, Archy wasn't happy there, and they weren't happy with him. After just 2 weeks, they thought the kindest thing to do might be to end Archy's life, but we wanted to get a veterinary evaluation first. We couldn't understand how he could have declined so much in just 2 weeks.

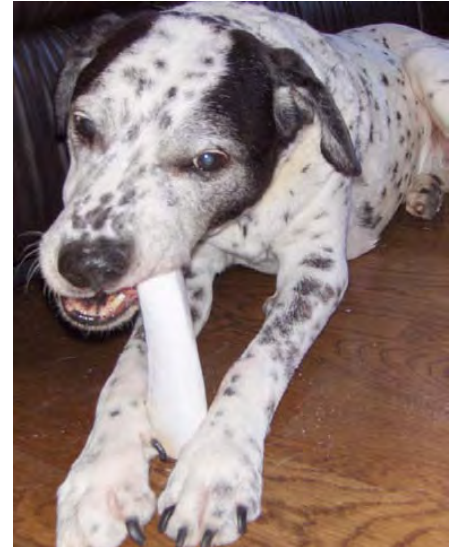
The good news is -- Archy passed the veterinary evaluation with flying colors! The veterinarian said he was just a senior dog, grieving the only family he had ever known. Archy was mobile, continent, engaged & healthy! He was just very sad! He said that Archy had plenty of time left to enjoy life, and to bring joy to another family.

With that, Archy came back to LCHS so we could try again. Archy was his happy, active, goofy senior self again! We even have video of him racing around the foster home playing with resident dog Batman after he returned to us.

Jim & Lisa had contacted us soon after we took Archy into foster care, so we let them know he was back with us, and they still wanted him! After several visits and a trial period with them, this time, we think we found the perfect family for Archy. He even gets along with the cats there! (And we really took our time finalizing the adoption this time. Jim & Lisa say they didn't resent our multiple visits and scrutiny at all. They understood we'd made a promise to Archy, and to his family of origin, that we would place him where he'd continue to be appreciated and treasured for exactly who he is. We didn't live up to that promise the first time. We weren't about to make the same mistake again.)

Archy was also our first Pets for Patriots adoption. Pets for Patriots is a national organization that supports adoption of "hard to place" (older, larger, special needs) pets with military and veteran families. They offer some GREAT benefits, and it costs nothing to register for their program. Learn more at <http://www.petsforpatriots.org>. Missy spent many months learning to be less afraid, thanks to Trainer Bruce, Foster Ladeana, her dog buddies Lucky and Charlie, and everyone who was patient and kind with her.

One day, Missy and Bruce were just hanging out at the Quik Trip at lunch time, watching the people go by. And magic happened. A couple saw Missy and came over to meet her and talk with Bruce. We weren't sure this was the right match, but we visited, saw how Missy was with them, and were convinced she had fallen in love. Within moments, Missy was curled up at someone's feet, then nuzzling into a lap, which was not exactly what we expected to see, at least not on the first visit. It became very obvious that this couple would keep her safe, and that they understood Missy's needs.



So, Missy's embarked on a new chapter. She's a happy girl, making new friends of all ages, and soaking up all the love surrounding her. All of us have a few unhappy times and some disappointments and unmet expectations along the way, but the journey teaches us things. Like it has Missy.

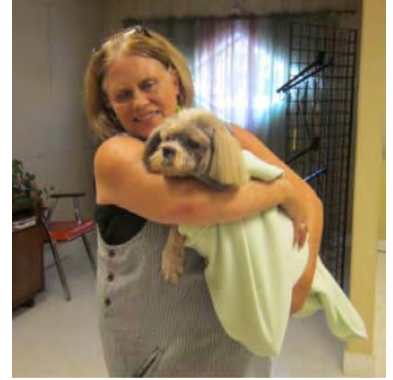

Mostly because there WERE people who cared about me.

Microchip Readers Donated

When Leavenworth Animal Control stopped in-taking animals from Lansing due to the flood this summer, Lansing PD and Animal Control also lost their ability to scan found pets for microchips. They didn't have their own microchip scanner. Well, we couldn't let that go on. So a donor was found to purchase a universal microchip scanner for them, and LCHS delivered it. Happy scanning, Lansing.

The same week, we decided it was time the one veterinary clinic in Leavenworth County who didn't have a scanner got one. Even if they don't want to emplace the chips. We found a donor to purchase a universal microchip scanner for them, and delivered it, too.



LCHS still has the scanner that was donated in 2010 for the Leavenworth County Sheriff's Department. However, with the lack of appropriate funding for animal services, the absence of a shelter that serves the entire county, and a less-than-clear animal control program, our offer of a microchip scanner has been declined. This leaves animals in need of care without a well-crafted official safety net, and citizens left to devise their own solutions, with not-for-profit groups helping as we can. LCHS stands ready with a donated microchip scanner whenever the County is ready for it.

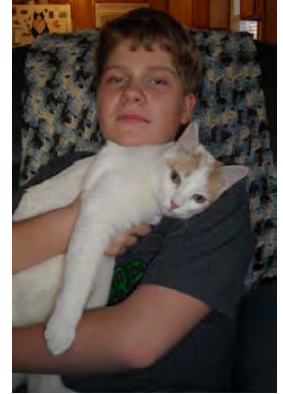

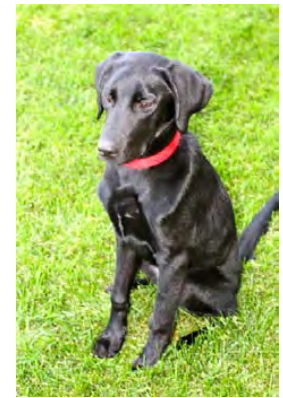


Sugar Sits!

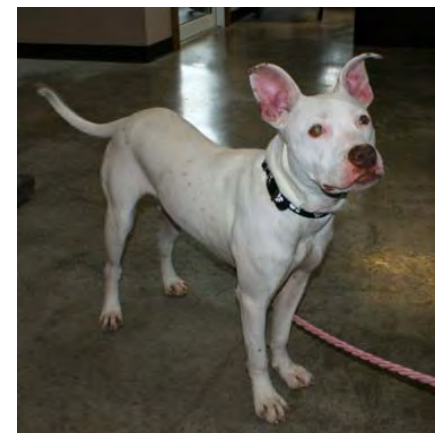

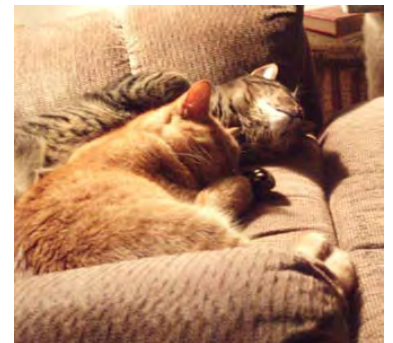

Litter Box Blues

One of the leading reasons cats are relinquished, or banished to outdoor life, is failure to use the litter box. There are lots of reasons this can happen, including medical and behavioral conditions that need veterinary treatment. Cats eliminating outside the box need to see a veterinarian to rule out these medical causes. The cat is NOT going outside the box to spite you or to get back at you. They don't think that way. If you can work out why the cat has stopped using the box, and make appropriate changes, the cat will use the box again.

There are environmental conditions that pet owners can control to help prevent litter box problems. They can be broadly divided into three categories.



A = Access/Availability

Location, location, locaton. If the litter box is located someplace where the cat can't or won't use it, you're going to have problems. In general, cats like having their litter boxes reasonably close to where they live. If the only litter box in the house is in the far back corner of the basement, next to something that makes loud and scary noises (like a furnace or a water heater, or a washer or dryer), the cat might decide to go someplace else.

It is generally recommended to have at least one litter box for each cat in the household. This is not an ironclad rule; however, it's not unusual for one of the resident cats to decide the other cats in the household should not be using "their" box. Multiple boxes in multiple locations of the house make it much more difficult for this cat to guard them all. It's also important that nothing bad ever happens in the litter box, such as being grabbed, administering medications, or being harassed by children or dogs. Once a cat decides that a litter box is a bad place, you'll have a hard time getting him to use that box again.

In multi-cat household, it's a good idea to have at least two exits for at least one of the boxes. A cat that's worried about being harassed or caught in the box will be much happier if it can see trouble coming and move away from it freely.

B = Big Box

Size matters. In general, cats like to have big boxes with plenty of space to move around and scratch. Some boxes marketed as "Large" are no larger than a piece of 8 1/2 x 11 inch paper. Cats need something larger than a piece of letter paper to be happy with their boxes. These small boxes are best suited for kittens or for cats in cages. The jumbo size boxes or even plastic bins work better.

Covered litter boxes can be great for keeping litter in the box, especially if your cat thinks he's a gopher. They can also be more attractive than an uncovered box and control odors better. The problem with covered boxes is that they do hold in the odor better and are easier to overlook when they're dirty. If your cats line up to use the box right after you scoop it, that could be a sign that they couldn't stand going into it before. Make them wait long enough for their bathroom to be cleaned and they might find someplace less disgusting.

Another problem with covered boxes can be accessibility. A cat that's worried about being caught in its box will be even more worried in a covered box with only one exit. It's easy for children, dogs, and other cats to trap a cat in a covered box.

C = Clumping Litter

Individual cats can have distinct preferences for litter, but studies using shelter cats show that the majority appear to prefer fine clumping litter over the more "chunky" granulated varieties. Within the clumping litters, the ones without dyes and perfumes are preferred over ones with scents.

The clumps should be scooped at least daily, but twice a day is even better. (Do you flush more than once a day?) The litter should be at least 3-4 inches deep, so that there's enough litter for the cat to scratch and cover up waste. If the clumps stick to the bottom, the litter is not deep enough. Each box should be completely emptied and washed once a month. A gentle cleaner, such as dish soap, is safest for the cat. Don't ever use Lysol on a litter box -- it's toxic to cats.

It's always best to give your cats the type of box that they prefer, but be aware that just because they use it doesn't mean that it's the best box for them. Cats have always refused to read the manual, so what applies to most cats might not apply to yours. It's even possible for two cats in the same household to prefer two different litter types. The key is to figure out what your cat will use. Don't be afraid to ask your veterinarian for advice and recommendations, if you and your cats are having litter box blues.

(Ed. Note: Making sure accidents are cleaned up promptly, and the scent removed is critical. Once a cat chooses a place to go that you don't like, it's hard to get them away from it if they can still smell the urine/feces they left before. There are many safe and effective products to eliminate these odors available at veterinary offices and pet supply stores. There are also cat attracting litters that can help get a cat back to their box, once other considerations above are addressed.)

Coming Together to Develop Solutions

LCHS, Inc. is pleased to be joining with County and City officials and other members of the community to develop solutions to address the lack of animal control services in the large part of our County where those services are not currently provided.

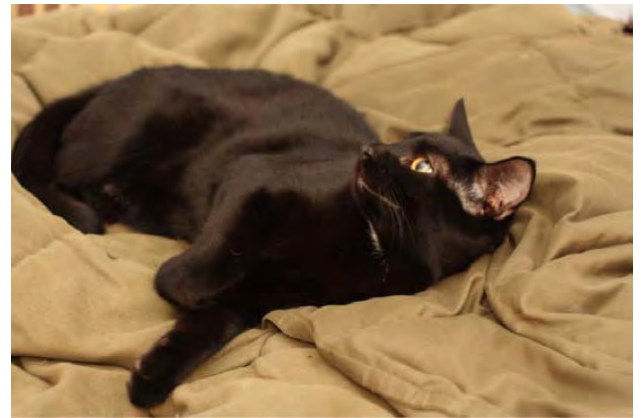
Honored to Help Friends

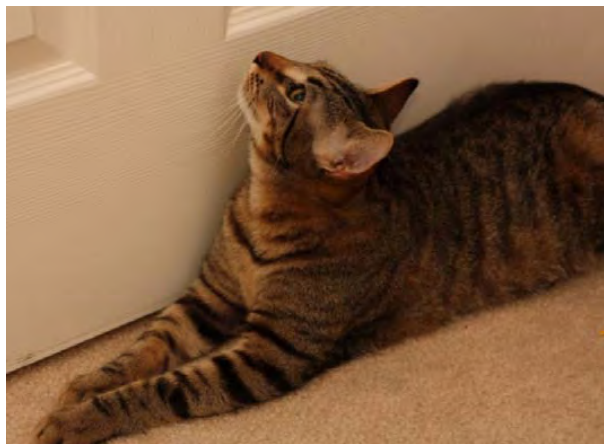
